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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Assessment of performance is an integral part of teaching and learning process. As a part of sound educational strategy, the college adopts Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System as recommended by University of Kerala to assess all aspects of a student's development on a continuous basis throughout each semester. For UG courses, 20 of the total mark is assigned from the performance in continuous evaluation. The mark distribution for continuous evaluation is configures for attendance percentage, successful submission of assignment and performance in class tests for each paper. Minimum 75 attendance is required for registering in university examination. For PG courses, 25 of the total mark for each paper is assigned from continuous evaluation. The distribution of marks in continuous evaluation is configured for entities such as attendance percentage, successful conduct of class seminars, successful submission of assignments and performance in class test for each paper. The class wise result analysis followed by class PTA meeting are imposed during the year for improvisation of results.

The college ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities by holding regular meetings of various committees constituted for this purpose and using the grants received the college as per the requirements in the interest of students. Laboratory Record of maintenance account is maintained by lab technicians and supervised by HODs of the concerned departments. The calibration, repairing and maintenance of sophisticated lab equipments are done by the technicians of related owner enterprises. The microscopes used for biological and physical sciences related experiments are annually cleaned and maintained by the concerned departments and record of maintenance is Kept by lab technicians and supervised by HODs of the concerned departments. There is systematic disposal of waste of all types such as biodegradable chemical/chemical and ewaste. In the Library, the requirement and list of books is taken from the concerned departments and HoDs are involved in the process. The finalized list of required books is duly approved and signed by the Principal. Suggestion box is installed inside the reading room to take users feedback. Their continuous feedback helps a lot in introducing new ideas regarding library enrichment. To ensure return of books, 'no dues' from the library is mandatory for students before appearing in exam. The proper account of visitors (students and staff) on daily basis is maintained. Other issues such as weeding out of old titles, schedule of issue/ return of books etc are chalked out / resolved by the library committee. Sports: Maintenance of Badminton/ basket ball / net ball court in the college is handled Physical education department. In their guidance accommodates are arranged. During the session 2018,19 college won the cricket intercollegiate championship. In 2018,19, the department of physical education conducted separate coaching camps for men and women in football, cricket, net ball, khokho, kabaddi and ball badminton. While the college participated in the Kerala University intercollegiate events in football, khokho, kabaddi, cricket, athletics, net ball, power lifting, best physique in the mens category, our women teams participated in athletics, ball badminton and net ball. The mens net ball team emerged runners up in the intercollegiate net ball tournament. During the year, the students were selected for the India interuniversity championship held at SRM University in Chennai. One student got selected to the Kerala state junior net ball camp.
